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

SIR CHARLES EVANS, MY MOUNTAIN-CLIMBING COUSIN Rosalind Morris




In May 1953 ten climbers from Britain and New Zealand were in the Himalayas preparing for an ascent of Mount Everest, slightly over 29,000 feet at the summit. Among them was my first cousin, Charles Evans, 33 years old. He was the son of Welsh parents and his first climbing experiences were in the Snowdonia Range of North Wales, followed by Switzerland and the Himalayas. He was Deputy Leader of the Everest Expedition in case the leader, Sir John Hunt, was incapacitated. He was also the barber for the team, probably because of his training as a surgeon.

After months of preparation and with the help of 34 Rosalind Morris Sherpas, equipment and supplies

Sherpas, equipment and supplies were carried from lower to higher camps. On May 26 Charles and another climber were

chosen to make the first attempt to reach the summit. They climbed to within about 300 feet of it and made the wise decision to turn back because their oxygen supply and the daylight hours were limiting factors. However, they were able to pass on information to the second team, Edmund Hillary and his Sherpa Tenzing, who on May 29 were the first explorers to reach the summit.

Charles had artistic ability and contributed black-and-white sketches to Sir John Hunt's book, *The Ascent of Everest*. He also produced a book of his sketches titled *Eye on Everest*. In 1955 he led a successful expedition to another Himalayan mountain, Kangchenjunga, and wrote a book about the experience.

In 1957 Charles married Denise Morin, a leading woman climber. Where did they spend their honeymoon? In the Himalayas, of course. The following year he was appointed Principal of the University College of North Wales at Bangor, a position he held for many years until he retired due to multiple sclerosis. He died in 1995.

Among the many honors he received during his life were medals from the American, Scottish, and Royal Geographical Societies for his explorations in the mountains of Nepal; President of the National Eisteddfod in Wales and initiation into the Bardic Circle in 1956; a knighthood in 1964; and twice Vice Chancellor of the University of Wales.

In 1954 some members of the Everest team traveled through The United States and Canada giving talks on their successful ascent. When they were in Colorado, I was invited to join them. It was a thrill for me to meet Charles because we had last seen each other as small children in Wales. After the team gave their talks in Denver, we went to the home of a lady mountain climber in Colorado Springs, and I had my first experience climbing with a rope in the Garden of the Gods. I had another rope-climbing experience on Snowdonia with Charles in 1956 when I was in Wales, and he was very patient with my lack of experience.

LETTER FROM WALES

Jean Owens received the following letter from her husband's second cousin:

"Another year gone by and Christmas approaching fast.having to put up with this crazy weather we are having. At the moment we are having severe gales and torrential showers, six of the glass panels in the green house were blown out yesterday. ... Last week a village quite near suffered a mini tornado, some property was badly damaged, it frightens people, we are not used to this sort of weather.

Parking has become a big problem in this country – too many cars on the road. We have a good bus service in Pennal and it's free for Pensioners, also a good rail service from Machynlleth

....oldest grandchild is working in Wales, decided to go to Welsh classes to learn the language. I'm very pleased with her. Most young people have gone to England to work like two of my girls, except for the farmers; they are the ones that keep the Welsh language going.

We are only a few elderly people attending (church), 12 at the most and just one or two services in a month. ...our chapel has closed down – we all go now to the Vestry that belongs to the other chapel.

Hope this finds you in good health. Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. All the best, Janet" (from Wales)

UPDATE ON ASTRONAUT'S FUTURE SPACE FLIGHT

We're continuing to follow the future NASA Space Shuttle Endeavour's STS-118 (Space Transportation System) mission to the International Space Station on which Canadian - and veteran - astronaut/aquanaut Dr. Dafydd (Dave) Rhys Williams will be returning to space for his second mission. His father was from Borgoed, South Wales. (Dr. Williams indicated he was planning to brush up on his Welsh so he can speak it in space again as he had on his first mission in 1998.

Dr. Dafydd Rhys Williams, The 11-day mission launch date will be no earlier than June 28, 2007. The STS-118 crew will lift into space to "continue the extraordinary task of assembling the International Space Station.

REMARKABLE WELSH WOMEN

We have known of the many famous Welshmen who have contributed to the development and progress of America. However, there are many women who have possibly gone unrecognized for their contributions to Wales – and America. Consider:

Varina Banks Howell Davis (5/7/1826 - 10/16/1905) - First Lady of Confederacy (5/1/1830 to 11/30/1930) - "The Miner's Angel" (Wales) Mary Harris Jones Dr. Martha Carey Thomas - (1/2/1857 - 12/2/1935) - American Educator and Feminist. (Became Bryn Mawr College's second president from 1894 - 1922) (1913 - 5/1992) - Organizer of the 1st Suffrage Petition Elizabeth David Petula Sally Olwen Clark (11/15/1932 -) – Music Laura Ashley (1925 - 1985) - Fashion Designer and Founder of a global fabric and furnishing empire Charlotte Church (2/21/1986 -) – Music Dr. Mary Edwards Walker (11/26/1832 - 2/21/1919) - First and Only Woman (so far) to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor. (Born in Oswego, NY)

Dr. Mary Edwards Walker was a pioneer woman physician and decorated Civil War heroine. She was the second woman in the U.S. to receive a medical degree, volunteering for the Union Army during the Civil War. On a number of occasions she would cross enemy lines to assist Georgians whose lives had been destroyed by the Civil War.

She devoted much of her life to advocating women's rights, including dress reform. At a time when most clothing for women was uncomfortable, and because they were less restrictive, she wore trousers.

She was the first woman ever to be awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, the nation's highest military award for valour having it presented to her by President Andrew Johnson because of her outstanding service with the Union Army during the worst years of the Civil War.

In 1917, when she was 85 years old, a special commission revised the rules for awarding the Congressional Medal of Honor and Mary, along with more than 900 others, had their medals "revoked" for "unusual circumstances." She refused to return the Congressional Medal back to the Army and wore it proudly every day until her death in 1919. Because of the continual efforts of her granddaughter, President Jimmy Carter signed a bill in 1977 reinstating her medal.
